BEAUTIFUL BOWLS RAISE \$4,700+ FOR UCM AT ANNUAL TORPEDO FACTORY SOUPER SATURDAY

The 21st annual SOUPer Saturday fundraiser was held on February 14 at the Torpedo Factory Art Center to benefit United Community Ministries. Hosted by the resident ceramic artists in collaboration with The Art League, Chart House restaurant, and the Torpedo Factory, the event raised a record-breaking more than \$4,700 to help fill the empty bowls – and empty pantries – of UCM's client families who struggle to make ends meet. All items were donated by the resident artists, and all proceeds directly benefit UCM's assistance programs. Last fiscal year, UCM provided emergency assistance to more than 8,800 people in Alexandria; more than 40% were children.

The resident ceramic artists at The Torpedo Factory Art Center hosted the 21st annual SOUPer Saturday event at the Torpedo Factory Art Center to help feed hungry families for more than 20 years. This year's event on February 14 included a wide variety of hundreds of artisan soup bowls and other art pieces, donated by local Torpedo Factory Art Center artists. Resident ceramic artists Susie Cohen, Susan Greenleaf, and Peggy Reichard were the primary organizers for this popular event.

More than \$4,700 was raised to help families in crisis with food and basic needs assistance so they can attain financial stability. For each \$20 donation to UCM, attendees selected a bowl or other ceramic item to take home and received a cup of clam chowder donated by Chart House restaurant.

"This is a wonderful community event, bringing together community members in such a creative way," says Christine Lucas, UCM Development and Communications Director. "We so appreciate our generous donors the ceramic artists, sharing their talents to support neighbors in need. We also extend a special thank you to The Torpedo Factory management and The Art League, as well as Chart House restaurant for their many years of delicious soup donations."

"Programs that help families in immediate need are at the core of UCM's work," she continues. "Thanks to community support, families have UCM as a caring place to turn for help. Our services include programs for children like early care and learning and after-school programs. For adults looking for work, we provide English language classes, job training and coaching, and citizenship classes. Our services inspire life-long changes that break the cycle of poverty."
